

# BEVERLY HILLS POLICE DEPARTMENT EXECUTIVE SUMMARY FEBRUARY 2021

#### **Crime Summary:**

During February 2021, we saw a decrease of **26%** in overall property crime **(-31)** compared to January 2021. We did see a significant increase in robberies (+6); however, we did make 6 arrests on several of the robberies. Overall, total crime remains down **-13%** year-to-date (197 less crimes committed). In February, our response time to emergency calls for service was near a record low of 1.46 minutes. We received 3,172 "911" calls during February 2021. This was 858 calls more than January 2021.

#### **Significant Accomplishments:**

- Burglary and theft from motor vehicle incidents are down 25%.
- Residential and Commercial burglaries are down 38%.
- Overall arrests are up 13% including robbery arrests at 500% and Motor Vehicle Theft at 125%.

#### **Crime Prevention:**

- Our Community Relations Unit (CRU) continues to work on the "Just in Case BH" committee.
- A public/private committee was launched between Beverly Hills Police Department and local retailers. A Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED) model will be used to help bring the City in line with the latest crime prevention strategies and mitigation techniques.

#### **Detective Bureau:**

- On February 12<sup>th</sup>, 2021, an armed robbery occurred near the intersection of Robertson Bl. and Wilshire Bl. at about 3:00 p.m. Information was developed by detectives leading to the identification of the suspect vehicle. The suspect vehicle was stopped later that day and three juvenile suspects were arrested. The victim's property was recovered and the case has been filed with the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office.
- On February 13<sup>th</sup>, 2021, an armed robbery occurred in the 9700 block of Wilshire Bl. at about 5:30 p.m. The victim was approached by a male suspect who produced a handgun and demanded the victim's cash, bracelet and necklace. An additional seven to eight suspects stood by as look outs while the crime occurred. All of the suspects fled the scene in four separate vehicles. Detectives have been working to identify the suspect vehicles and suspects involved in the crime. Three of the vehicles have been identified. Two suspects have also been identified and arrest warrants are imminent.
- On February 14<sup>th</sup>, 2021, an attempted armed robbery occurred in the 9500 block of Brighton Way at about 2:00 p.m. Two victims were approached by a male suspect and a female suspect. The male suspect pointed a handgun at the victims and demanded the victim's jewelry. The suspects were scared off by the female victim's screams and ran to a nearby vehicle where another female suspect drove the vehicle away from the scene. Information was developed by detectives regarding the suspect vehicle and later that evening the vehicle was located by another police department. The two females were arrested and the third male suspect has been identified, investigation is continuing.

#### **Geographical Policing:**

A Beverly Hills Homeless Collaboration meeting took place with Geographical Police Officers present. They spoke about a recent arson arrest of a homeless person as well as upcoming homeless outreach game plans to be deployed during March. They also discussed upcoming training presented by the California Peace Officers' Association (CPOA). This training will cover trespass arrests, the Martin v. Boise court decision, and Homeless Liaison Training. We continue to work closely with Community Services regarding Homeless Outreach.

#### **Traffic Deployments:**

- Motor Officers have continued their enforcement efforts in areas where traffic collisions are prevalent.
- During February 2021, we issued 10,577 parking citations; which, was an increase of **78%** compared to January 2021.
- We had two fatal traffic collisions in February 2021. We had zero fatal traffic collisions in 2020.

Crime Category	Sub-Category	Description
ASSAULT	Assault – Aggravated	An assault with a weapon or with the intent to inflict severe or aggravated bodily injury.
	Assault – Simple	An assault with no intent and not resulting in severe or aggravated bodily injury.
	Assaults – Prior to Sept 2018	All aggravated and simple assaults (previously combined).
BURGLARY	Burglary – Commercial Building	Entry into a commercial business after business hours with the intent to commit theft
	Burglary – Construction Site	Any entry onto a construction site with intent to commit theft.
	Burglary – Residential (Accessed Garage Only)	Entry <u>limited</u> to a garage (subterranean, attached to residence, detached from residence) with intent to commit theft.
	Burglary – Residential (Home Occupied)	Entry into a residence with the intent to commit a theft or any felony while the residence is occupied at the time of the crime.
	Burglary – Residential (Common Area)	Entry <u>limited</u> to a common mail area or laundry room of a multi-family residence with the intent to commit mail theft or coin theft.
	Burglary – Residential (No One Home)	Entry into a residence with the intent to commit a theft or any felony when no one is home at the time of the crime.
DUI ARREST		The arrest of a person for driving while under the influence of any alcoholic beverage or drug.
HOMICIDE		The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.
MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT	Motor Vehicle Theft	The theft of a motor vehicle.
ROBBERY	Shoplift Robbery	A shoplifter uses force against store security to retain property stolen from the location.
	Robbery	The taking of anything of value from a person by force or threat of force or violence.
SEX CRIMES		Includes rape, sexual battery and sex registrant violations.
THEFT/LARCENY	Theft – Grand	Theft where the value of the property exceeds \$950, or is taken from a person, or a firearm of any value.
	Theft – Petty	Theft where the value of the property is less than \$950.
	Theft From Commercial Building	Theft (regardless of value) from a commercial business, building or office.
	Theft of Auto Parts	Theft, limited to auto parts, from the interior or exterior of a vehicle.
VANDALISM		The malicious destruction, damage or defacing (graffiti) of real or personal property of another.
VEHICLE BREAK- IN/THEFT	Theft – Grand (From Vehicle)	Entry into a motor vehicle, without force, where the property stolen exceeds \$950.
	Theft – Petty (From Vehicle)	Entry into a motor vehicle, without force, where the property stolen is less than \$950.
	Burglary – From a Motor Vehicle	Forced entry into a locked motor vehicle with the intent to commit theft.
