



ASSAULT	Assault – Aggravated	An assault with a weapon or with the intent to inflict severe or aggravated bodily injury.

BEVERLY HILLS POLICE DEPARTMENT MAY 2020 SUMMARY FOR MONTHLY REPORT

Crime Summary:

During the month of May, we had three (3) more violent crimes and forty-eight (48) more property crimes than April 2020. On May 30th and May 31st, we had a substantial increase in Commercial Burglaries due to the civil unrest and looting that took place throughout the city. Overall, total crime is still down **14%** year-to-date. Our response time to emergency calls for service was 2.43 minutes and we received 2,552 "911" calls; which, is 327 more than April 2020.

Significant Accomplishments:

- We continued to be an integral part of our Emergency Operations Center (EOC) in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- We sent out numerous Temporary Standard Operations Procedures to our department personnel regarding our COVID-19 protocols and response.
- The Beverly Hills Police Department, through the EOC, has created a COVID-19 Hotline (310-550-4860) for community members. The Hotline is staffed Monday Friday (9am 6pm).
- The Department temporarily pulled most of our resources (including Traffic and the Crime Impact Team) into Patrol and deployed a modified staffing schedule to better adapt to COVID-19 and keep our employees healthy; meanwhile, still providing the same level of service to our community served.
- We have made significantly more arrests in May 2020 as compared to April 2020 and have also seen large traffic enforcement citation increases in May 2020 as compared to April 2020.

Crime Prevention:

Our Community Relations Unit posted a Community Public Service Announcement video on our department's YouTube channel and Nixle regarding our COVID-19 response (i.e., Face Coverings, Dispatchers Week, Donations to BHPD and Community Appreciation).

Detective Bureau:

- Detective personnel continued to support the A&B shift schedule through the first half of May due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- On May 30th, Detective Personnel were recalled to the City as additional supporting law enforcement resources. They were required to quell the civil unrest and looting taking place throughout the city.
- It should be noted a majority of the increases in commercial burglaries for the month of May was a direct result of the window smashes and looting throughout the business districts in the City on May 30th and May 31st stemming from the civil unrest and protests.

Geographical Policing:

- During the month of May, officers focused their efforts on educating the public on how to comply with social distancing and the face covering ordinance.
- With the combined efforts of the Geographical Policing Officers, City Attorney's Office and Code Enforcement, the nuisance complaints from 240 S Rodeo Dr have been reduced significantly.
- Officers were redeployed to focus their efforts on the civil unrest and looting that took place throughout the city the last two days in May.

Traffic Deployments:

- Motor officers continued to support the A&B shift schedule through the first half of May due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- On May 30th and May 31st, Motor Officers were reassigned to patrol to help quell the civil unrest and looting that took place throughout the city.
